### 2019-20 Budget Approved

Council approved its budget for 2019-20 with a focus on delivering and maintaining quality services for its growing community.

The 2019-20 budget provides for a total rating increase of 2.9 per cent, excluding the State Government Fire Levy.

In setting the budget, council was conscious of increasing costs associated with waste management services, and the loss of income from reduced TasWater dividends.

The rate increase is above the March Consumer Price Index for Hobart of 2.1 per cent and below the annual movement in the most recent Local Government of Tasmania (LGAT) Council Cost Index of 3.3 per cent.

The LGAT Council Cost Index is considered to be the better measure of the true cost of providing local government infrastructure and services.

"We have developed a budget that balances affordability with the need to provide the necessary infrastructure and levels of services for our growing city," Mayor of Clarence, Alderman Doug Chipman said.

"We are committed to investing in services and programs where people of all ages and abilities have the opportunity to improve their health and quality of life," said Mayor Chipman.

Significant budget expenditure items included:

- Stormwater works at Blessington Street in South Arm and Elinga/ Carella Street in Howrah/ Tranmere; Percy Street in Bellerive and Bangalee Street in Lauderdale;
- Footpath, kerb and gutter works on Hadlow Road in Lauderdale;
- Black Spot road improvement program on Sugarloaf Road in Risdon Vale;
- Wellington Street road upgrade in Richmond;
- Irrigation and reserve rejuvenation work at Victoria Esplanade in Bellerive;
- Irrigation upgrade to Lindisfarne Oval No. 1;
- Irrigation, drainage works, goal post replacement and improvement of parking and pedestrian access at Risdon Vale Oval;
- Construction of 3.3km track at Clarence Mountain Bike Park in the Meehan Range, Mornington;
- Development of Barilla Rivulet track in Cambridge;
- Next stage of upgrade to Clarence Foreshore Trail between Simmons

- Park and ANZAC Park in Lindisfarne;
- Planning of Bayview Secondary College sporting precinct in Clarendon Vale;
- Lauderdale Oval carpark seal;
- Development of new park at Blossom Court in Cambridge;
- Upgrade of entrance work at Beltana Park in Lindisfarne;
- Site search for a new south east regional play park and a new dog exercise park;
- Upgrade including accessibility facilities of Alma Street Senior Citizen's Centre in Bellerive; and
- Upgrade including accessibility facilities of public toilets on Jetty Road, South Arm.

We will continue to focus on improvements to road infrastructure with \$5.2m allocated for road reconstruction and resealing and \$1.8m on the renewal of footpaths, kerb and gutter.

Along with other Australian councils, recycling costs have increased due to higher quality control requirements. This, along with high demand for the popular annual hardwaste collection service, has contributed to an additional \$321,000 being required to meet waste collection costs.

## **Fresh Valuation Explained**

Received a letter about your property value and are unsure of what it's about? Fresh valuations are a statutory requirement and are conducted by the Valuer - General.

Every six to seven years each council is required to have a fresh valuation of properties within the manicipality. This year Clarence City Council, along with the Brighton, Break O' Day, George Town, Meander Valley, Northern Midlands,

Burnie, Central Coast, and Circular Head Councils were revalued.

Each property in Clarence has been individually revalued by a valuation contractor. The Valuer General then mails all property owners a Valuation Notice that advises them of their revised Land Value, Capital Value and Assessed Annual Value.

There is no direct correlation between an increase in valuation and rates. The valuation is used as an apportionment mechanism only, for example, if property valuation has increased by 30% it does not mean the rates will also increase by 30%.

## **Cambridge Oval Stormwater Project Success**

We recently completed a significant stormwater harvesting and re-use project in Cambridge.

The project involves the collection of stormwater runoff from the nearby residential catchment, which is then treated and re-used for the irrigation of adjacent sports grounds.

The stormwater harvesting and reuse system allows us to sustainably manage a resource which would otherwise discharge into local waterways, and reduces our reliance on potable water. The overall quality of water discharging into the local waterways is also significantly improved.

The Cambridge site was identified as ideal for this project due to the location of a dis-used sewerage lagoon on site which could be readily converted to a large inground storage facility for holding

the treated stormwater.

The next stage of the project was the construction of a gravity stormwater collection system connecting to the residential reticulated stormwater system already in place, and a pump/ treatment station to extract water and pump it through treatment filters and UV disinfection.

The treated stormwater is then

blended or 'shandied' with potable water as it joins the existing sports ground irrigation system.

"Clarence City Council prides itself on embracing opportunities to promote sustainable water management practices and will continue to seek future opportunities for similar projects," said Mayor of Clarence, Alderman Doug Chipman.



## **Restoration Works for Lindisfarne Cenotaph**

We undertook important restoration works of the Lindisfarne Cenotaph, at ANZAC Park, in time for this year's ANZAC Day Service.

"The Lindisfarne Cenotaph and ANZAC Park have a special place in the Clarence community. Indeed, ANZAC Park is widely acknowledged as one of, if not the best, Remembrance Park in Tasmania", said Mayor of Clarence, Alderman Doug Chipman.

"Clarence City Council firmly believes it has a duty of care towards important monuments within our city and was very pleased to work with the Lindisfarne RSL Sub-Branch and the Lindisfarne Historical Society to ensure that the ANZAC Park Cenotaph is protected and preserved into the future," Mayor Chipman concluded.

## **Trolley Trash Clean Up Push**

The major supermarket chains are united in an appeal to the public to help report the location of abandoned shopping trolleys.

The cost of collecting, maintaining and replacing trolleys each year is over \$50 million, with approximately 5% of all trolleys replaced each year either because they go missing, are stolen or damaged beyond repair. The average trolley costs \$150.00 to replace, while trolleys with special features (such as child seats) can cost up to \$600.00.

It is an offence under the *Litter Act* to dump shopping trolleys with fines up to 20 penalty units or \$3,260, however the number of lost or abandoned trolleys continues to rise.

which can be downloaded onto smartphones.

As an incentive every wayward trolley reported enters the applicant into a monthly draw that awards 5 entrants \$1000.00 in each state.

Similarly, Coles has established a hotline 1800 TROLLEY (1800 876553), an email address, 1800Trolley@coles. com.au, and a free app which can be downloaded where members of the public can alert the supermarket about lost trolleys.

## Clarence Kayak Trail Wins Award of Excellence

In early July our innovative Clarence Kayak Trail won the Award of Excellence for Parks and Open Space Projects in the Australian Institute of Landscape Architects (AILA) (Tasmania) Awards.

Launched in late 2018, the Clarence Kayak Trail details eight coastal paddle trails around Clarence suitable for beginners through to advanced kayakers in a waterproof, tear-proof brochure.
