# **BE BUSHFIRE AWARE AND PREPARE!**

The summer bushfire season is underway. Read on to discover ways to keep your property safe and help protect our community

The summer bushfire season is well and truly underway and predicted to be one of the most dangerous on record.

WE ALL HAVE A ROLE TO PLAY IN KEEPING OUR COMMUNITY SAFE

To ensure the safety everyone in our community, we are strongly urging owners and occupiers of land Clarence within to properly prepare for the season ahead and clear any fire hazards within their property. Reducing fire hazards for suburban blocks and blocks up to 2,000 square metres involves clearing and removing all grasses, scrub and undergrowth to a height of no more than 75mm.

For larger blocks over 2,000 square metres, fire breaks are required at a width of 10m for flat land or 15m for sloped land from the property boundary.

Trees should be preserved where possible however trees and large shrubs should have limbs removed to a height of two metres from the ground. Vegetation such

as shrubs should be no closer than two metres from windows.

Before undertaking any of these works, please check with council whether your property is subject to environmental protections under the Planning Scheme and if so, what limitations these have on clearing.

Clarence City Council operational staff have donated life saving devices won at a WorkSafe Tasmania safety month event to the Clarence community.

The event, hosted by TasWater in October, included useful information and practical exercises on driver fatigue and the effects that drugs and alcohol have on the ability to operate a vehicle safely.

Clarence City Council staff were presented with a large first-aid trauma kit for their excellent teamwork and safety knowledge.

The council team donated their prize to not-for-profit organisation Howrah Scouts, for the group to use on their camping trips.

Mayor of Clarence, Doug Chipman praised the council staff.

"I commend our staff for their professionalism during the challenge. Their generosity to the community is also admirable."

Following the event, TasWater further expressed how impressed they were with how council's operation staff undertook the risk assessment by gifting council with an Automatic Emergency Defibrillator (AED).

The AED will be placed in the Clarence community.

### **SUMMER BEACH** RESTRICTIONS





BPAY is an online banking facility provided by most banks that allows you to pay your rates online.

Council's old rate BPAY Biller Code 241927 closed on Tuesday 31 December 2019.

On 1 July 2019, in conjunction with the transition to the new rates system, a new BPAY Biller code 129163 was created. The transition to council's new property and rating system resulted in a 13-digit payment reference number that identifies the property to be paid that differs from the previous 6-digit payment reference number. To minimise the risk of our customers paying to their old payment reference number, a new BPAY biller code that recognises the new 13-digit payment reference number has been created.

If you have been paying using the old BPAY biller code since the 1 July, your payments have been allocated to your property.

This has been possible due to additional council administration processes that were put in place to provide customers sufficient time to update their details. However the old BPAY biller code was closed on 31 December 2019. Please check your online banking information and update your BPAY details if you are still using the old BPAY biller code 241927.

It is important that you DELETE the old biller code and then input the new biller code and the new 13-digit payment reference number. You will find our new BPAY biller code 129163 and your new 13-digit payment reference number on your notice of rates or on your rates reminder notice.

From 31 December 2019 any payments that were scheduled to the old BPAY biller code 241927 will NOT be processed by your bank. Please contact your bank if you are experiencing difficulties updating your internet banking details.

### RISDON VALE RIVULET **WALK TO RECEIVE FACELIFT**



The Risdon Vale Rivulet walk is a semi-urban walking track providing an important link within the network of open space as well as providing a connection to significant trails like the Meehan Range.

Utilising the Risdon Vale Recreation and Community Facilities Plan 2017-2037, council officers have been working with the Risdon Vale Bike Collective to design localised trail heads or entrances in the area to highlight the walk.

As well as drawing attention to the various available entrances, the first new starting point for the trail will also serve as a dedication to local identity Ann Harrison who works at the Risdon Vale Community Centre.

Ann is a powerhouse of community advocacy and support, working alongside the local community, and advocating for their wellbeing. Ann's trail-entrance will begin construction in the new year.



# **SUNNY SIDE UP FOR CLARENCE POOL**

The Clarence City Council is working toward a more sustainable future by reducing green house emissions. Read on to find out more!

Clarence Aquatic Centre has recently further increased energy efficiency by adding even more solar panels to the roof of the centre.

The new panels will add an additional 25 kilowatts of generating power to the 75 kilowatts that have been operating since July 2018.

This solar array provides the power that runs the building's lighting and the pumps that circulate the pool's water. The day time generation is well matched to the building's day time use, so no excess power is fed to the grid.

In the first year after installation, the 75 kilowatt system generated 102,000 kilowatt hours of electricity, saving ratepayers approximately \$15,000.

The cost saving predicted from the additional 25 kilowatt of panels is \$3,650 in the first year, which gives an estimated time of only eight years for the cost of the system to be recouped.

The energy efficiency of the building has been maximised with energy efficient lighting, low flow shower heads, heat pump water heaters, and a pool blanket to keep heat in the pool when it is not being used. These measures ensure that the energy generated from the solar panels is not wasted.

This is just one of many actions that council is implementing to save money and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

### CLARENDON VALE COMMUNITY PARK RENAME A HIT

Clarence City Council has been working with Mission Australia Housing (MAH) and the Spaces Community Group on an overall plan for the recently renamed community park.

Council has planted around 60 new trees and created 2 new garden beds that the Spaces Community Group and wider community will maintain and plant with food for the community.

Local primary schools are also becoming involved in the maintenance and care of the park and locals are hopeful that this will lead to increased participation and inclusion for the whole community.
