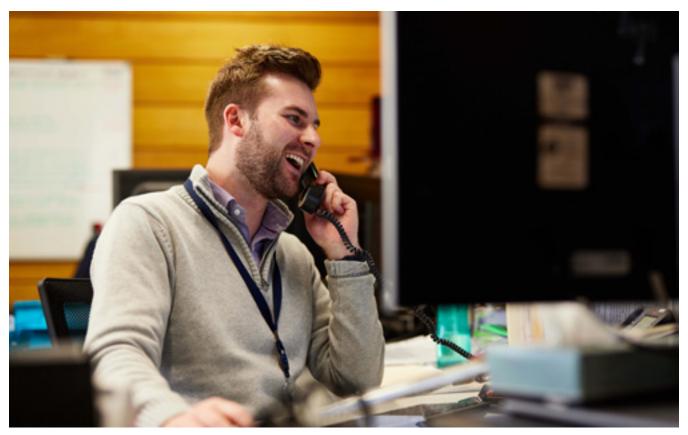

Underpinned by the following key organisational goals:

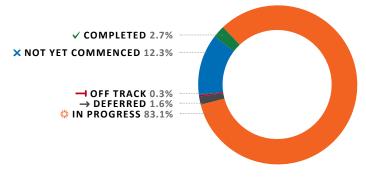

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

2022-23 Budget & Annual Plan

Kicking off the first quarter, council approved its 2022-23 Budget. The 2022-23 Estimates and its associated works program included a general rate increase on average of 4.82%. Through targeted savings and prioritisation, council was able to deliver a budget that saw a rate increase around 1% below Hobart's consumer price index (CPI March 2022). The budget also included a capital works program of \$16.8 million, which increased the total of the ongoing capital works to approximately \$53 million in 2022-23. As part of this budget process, council also adopted its 2022-23 Annual Plan, which outlines council's major actions and initiatives for the upcoming financial year. Scan the QR code to read more.

Waste collection

Throughout the quarter, council worked through a staged transition to a new provider for its kerbside collection services, with Cleanaway now responsible for all kerbside collection in the City of Clarence. This transition included the phasing of green waste and recycling collection to Cleanaway at the start of August and finished with them taking over general waste collection on 29 August. Council is obligated to go through a rigorous and transparent tender process



for the procurement of services, including waste contracts, and this provider transition is an outcome from a tender process that seeks to deliver the best value and service to Clarence residents over the life of the contract. Throughout the transition, the previous contractors experienced significant

resourcing impacts, including the impact of COVID-19. As a result of this, council made the difficult decision to temporarily halt green waste and recycling collection. At its meeting on 25 July, council voted in favour of crediting all ratepayers for the missed recycling and green waste services, with the credits applied to each ratepayer account and deducted from future rate payments.

Council also went out for tender on its hard waste collection service this quarter but did not receive any complying responses in line with its needs — namely, the efficient collection of the waste over a short period of time. Council has authorised the Chief Executive Officer to seek alternative proposals from a provider to find an acceptable solution, with the plan to deliver the popular service early in 2023.



Consultations

Council launched the second stage of the Clarence Plains Master Plan consultation in September, calling on all community members to help shape the future of the fast-growing area by providing comment on the draft plan. The Clarence Plains Master Plan will help guide future growth and development in the area and create a unified plan for the community's future. Once consultation closes, community feedback will be used to refine the draft strategy before it is presented to council for endorsement.

Also approved for consultation this quarter were the draft Sustainability, Cultural Creative, and Digital Strategies for 2022-2032. These strategies are three of the seven key strategies that underpin council's Strategic Plan 2021-2031.

Council also sought community input on the Seven Mile Beach Local Area Plan consultation, which will inform the preparation of a Local Area Plan for the sustainable growth and management of Seven Mile Beach. The consultation spanned a range of topics including character, housing, environment, servicing, and community facilities. Faceto-face consultations were held at a range of locations in Seven Mile Beach.



City Heart Project

Council is excited to be taking the next step in its longterm, large-scale urban planning project, creating a heart for Clarence city. The project area includes Rosny Park Activity Centre (CBD), Rosny Parkland (formerly the Rosny Park Golf Course), Charles Hand Park, Rosny Farm and Barn, Sheoak Point, Kangaroo Bay, Bellerive Village, Council Chambers and lawns, and part of Warrane. This quarter, council sought a multi-disciplinary consulting team with vision to develop a holistic and integrated plan for growth and development in Clarence's principal activity centre and surrounds. The City Heart Request for Quotation was advertised in July and council officers undertook an evaluation of the 10 proposals received, with interviews conducted for three shortlisted respondents. MGS Architects were engaged, with subconsultants Inspiring Place, SGS Economics and Planning, Sharnie Read, Mosaic Lab, Irene Inc., Leigh Woolley, Movement and Place Consulting, and WT Partnership making up the team.

While COVID-19 has disrupted this project over the past two years, it is exciting to have it back on track. One of the key goals of the City Heart Plan is to ensure that growth and change in the city is coordinated, and that outcomes are aligned with the community's long-term needs, aspirations and goals. More than just a plan for strategic growth, the City Heart Project is an opportunity for the community to share and celebrate Clarence's unique sense of place and belonging and create a heart in our city that reflects our unique identity and optimises our spaces to suit our collective needs. Tree vandalism and revegetation

Following a callous act of vandalism last year that resulted in 11 Eucalyptus trees poisoned, 10 of which were threatened species, council has replanted several semi-mature Eucalypts in their place, reinforcing our commitment to restore vegetation in the area. Since the vandalism, council has put measures in place to reduce such callous acts of vandalism through the adoption of our Tree Policy and installation of signage encouraging the public to report any information to Crime Stoppers, as well as working closely with the Bellerive/Howrah coastcare group. The planted trees will continue to be monitored to ensure they continue to be safe to the public while maturing. Council will continue to remove any dead limbs from the existing tree trunks, which will remain in place to provide habitat for native wildlife and perching opportunities for birds that frequent this area.

Pass Road

This quarter, council allocated funding to survey, design and deliver road reconstruction of the pavement on Pass Road between Winterbourne and Connor Place. Survey works at this location were concluded and design is currently underway so that it can be ready to be delivered for construction. Council also has future plans to upgrade the road section of Pass Road between Glebe Hill Road and Winterborne Road (subject to council funding approval).



Water quality

Despite significant work by council to investigate the stormwater and sewer network in the area, the middle section of Howrah Beach has retained a 'poor' rating. This means that a no swimming recommendation remains

for this section of beach for the next 12 months. Bellerive Beach West also received a slight downgrade from good to fair. Swimming is still fine in this area and council officers are ramping up work in this catchment as an extension of the work occurring in the Howrah region.

Breathe easy

Council is leading the way across the state by continuing to create and expand healthy and welcoming spaces for the community through its 'Breathe Easy Clarence - Smoke Free Area' campaign. Due to strong and ongoing public demand, council's environmental health unit is building on previous successes – such as establishing the greater smoke-free area around Blundstone Arena which is patrolled by council officers during BBL and AFL games and turned its attention to the Rosny Bus Mall. While the Rosny Bus Mall has been declared a smoke-free area under the Public Health Act 1997, a new smoke-free plan for the area identified where appropriate signage could be erected to more clearly communicate the environmental guidelines. The new signage was erected at intervals throughout Rosny Bus Mall and comprises the well-known smoke-free decals that have been used around Blundstone Arena with the public health message 'Breathe Easy - You are in a SMOKE FREE area'. With the signage in place, council Environmental Health Officers will perform regular visits to the mall to monitor compliance.

Rosny Early Learning Assessment Results

The results from council's Rosny Early Learning Assessment and Ratings accreditation were announced this quarter, with the service achieving an incredible 'Exceeding' National Quality Standard outcome. This achievement is two whole standard outcomes up from the most recent assessment in 2018 and puts the council-run service in the top 34 percent of Long Day Services state-wide. Rosny Early Learning management and staff have worked extremely hard over the past 2.5 years to make several positive changes in the service. These include the outstanding garden renovation, changes to the physical environment indoors, improved sustainability practices within the service, and the introduction of an online communication and programming platform.

Rose Bay Ferry Marker

Council has unveiled a new ferry marker commemorating the history of Clarence's waterways and the importance of ferry travel to the Eastern Shore. Located in Rose Bay, the marker records the site of the Rose Bay jetty which was built in 1912 by a company trying to sell hundreds of acres of home sites at Rose Bay. The marker also records a remarkable and largely forgotten era of transport in Tasmania – the Flying Boat. Between 1953 and 1970 Ansett



ran a 'Flying Boat' service between Sydney and Hobart. The planes in the specialised service were able to land on water (hence the name), and depending on weather, landed either at the Regatta Grounds in Hobart or in Rose Bay. The Rose Bay marker is the third in a series located at various

points along the Clarence Foreshore Trail, which celebrate the rich and unique history of a time in Clarence when ferries were the primary method of transportation.

Clarence Jazz Scholars

This quarter, council announced the recipients of the Clarence Jazz Festival Scholarship program as Finnie River (voice), Louis Monaghan (piano) and Jode Brewster (saxophone). Over the next six months, the scholars will be put through their paces participating in a revamped program funded by council and the Ian Pearce Memorial Fund (through Hobart Jazz Club). In addition to appearances at the 2023 Jazz Festival, the program includes one-on-one tuition, intensive rhythm section sessions, and the opportunity to develop stagecraft, repertoire and collaborative skills with scholarship mentor and local jazz legend Katy Raucher.

Clarence Open Art Exhibition

The ever-popular Clarence Open Art Exhibition returned this quarter, delivering another year of vibrant and diverse community art at the Rosny Farm Arts Centre. The biennial exhibition provided a valuable opportunity for Tasmanian artists at every level of skill and experience to participate in a professional showcase and gave the wider community an opportunity to discover and enjoy local artists. This year, the community was back in force with more than 200 entries on display for the exhibition, including paintings, photography, drawings, and print works.

Poochibald Art Prize

Council's annual paw-traiture exhibition, the Poochibald Art Prize, returned in September and shone a spotlight on



our beloved four-legged friends. Now in its 10th year, this popular event is an annual opportunity for community members and artists to unleash their creativity and submit a painting, drawing, print or small sculpture of their own dog, a dog they know or even a famous dog to be judged and

exhibited in adult, kids and junior categories. This year 113 entrants submitted artworks to the exhibition, with the youngest artists only six years old. The 2022 Poochibald Art Prize winners were: Lynden Coad (Adult)(pictured), Lucy Chenlu (Junior), and Neo Pan (Senior Child). Rangers' Selections were Anna Holan (Adult), Mila Bischoff (Junior), and Rosie McClean (Senior).

Clarence Community Volunteer Service

It was a noteworthy quarter for council's Clarence Community Volunteer Service (CCVS), which was successful in obtaining additional ongoing funding from the Commonwealth Home Support Program to the amount of \$60,614. This additional funding recognises the increased service the program has provided to the Clarence community, as well as the work council does to support an age-inclusive city and community. The funding will be used to further support the program to increase service provision and consumer numbers across all service types (transport, social support, light gardening, and shopping). The CCVS also underwent an audit and assessment by the Australian Government Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission. The quality audit was conducted to assess the quality of care and services provided through the service against the relevant aged care quality standards. It reported that the CCVS met all the relevant six standards, meaning it is performing at an optimal level.

Works

Council's depot crew undertook several works and upgrades across the city throughout the quarter. Of note, this included an upgrade of the Icy Creek Lane incorporating a full road reconstruction, new kerb and gutter on both sides, DDA crossings, a new footpath down one side of the road, construction of new stormwater soakage trenches and a full asphalt seal. Works were also undertaken on an upgrade to the Lauderdale Water Point, stormwater construction at Cambridge Road No. 670, and a kerb and gutter upgrade at Lantana Road as part of council's Road Reseal Preparation Program.

MAJOR STRATEGIC PROJECTS AND INITIATIVES

There are several key projects and initiatives identified as priorities for council in its Strategic Plan 2021-2031. These projects are significant in their nature and involve long-term commitments by council. This section of the Quarterly Report seeks to provide a more detailed update on these projects and initiatives, despite them also being referenced and referred to in the strategic goals area tables.

City Deal

We continued to work as part of the Greater Hobart Committee over the course of the quarter to work towards the 10-year vision of the City Deal. Updates on progress can be found by visiting www.infrastructure.gov.au/territories-regions-cities/cities/city-deals/hobart-city-deal.

Bayview Regional Sporting Precinct

The Master Plan was endorsed by council in October 2021 with the recommendation to undertake a detailed Feasibility Study and Business Case for the proposed sporting precinct, to understand the development in greater detail. This Feasibility Study and Business Case will be presented to council in 2023.

City Heart

The City Heart Plan Request For Quotation was advertised in July. After significant interest from consultants around the country, officers undertook an evaluation of ten proposals received, with interviews conducted for three shortlisted respondents in August. Following this, MGS Architects were engaged in September, with subconsultants Inspiring Place, SGS Economics and Planning, Sharnie Read, Mosaic Lab, Irene Inc., Leigh Woolley, Movement and Place Consulting, and WT Partnership making up the team. Further community engagement will be undertaken as part of the project in the second quarter.

Clarence Plains Master Plan

Consultation on the draft Master Plan was undertaken throughout the end of the quarter and into the second quarter. A report from this phase will be provided to the consultants and elected members on stakeholder and community feedback ahead of any changes and final adoption of the master plan later in 2022 or early in 2023.

Kangaroo Bay Development Precinct

Council approved a development application for the Kangaroo Bay Boulevard site at a special council meeting on 8 November 2021. Sale of the land is currently being negotiated with the developer. Chambroad has continued to provide council with updates on progress for the Hotel and Education project, which have been tabled at relevant council meetings.

Rosny Hill

Council continued to work with the proponents on reviewing key sub-lease terms for the Rosny Hill site during the quarter.

Tranmere/Rokeby Peninsula Structure Plan

This project is currently on hold in anticipation of council giving consideration to a proposed Drougthy Point/ Skylands Master Plan and how it might interlink with the structure plan.

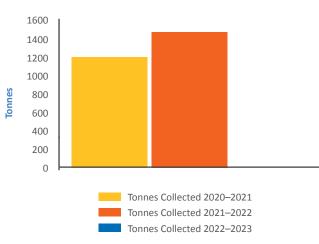

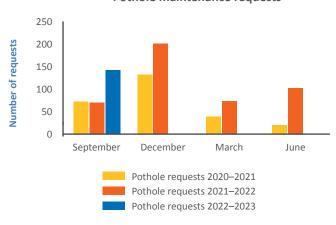

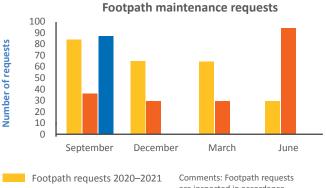

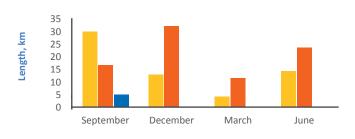

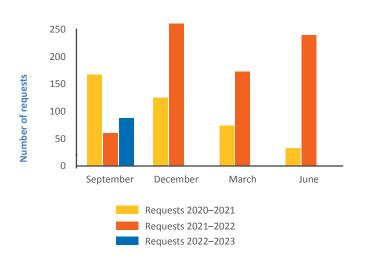

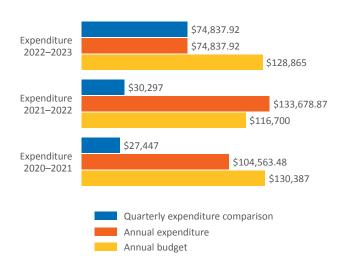

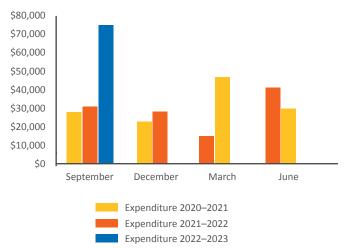

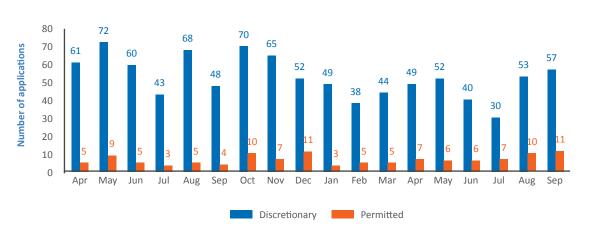
Vandalism and graffiti expenditure comparison



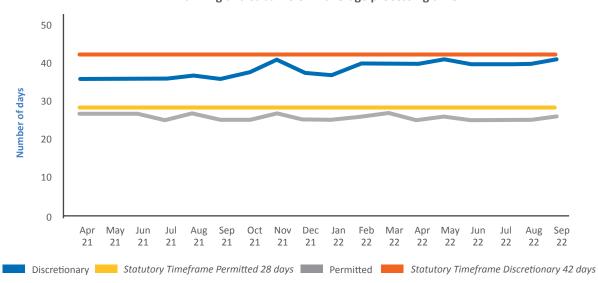
Vandalism and graffiti costs per quarter

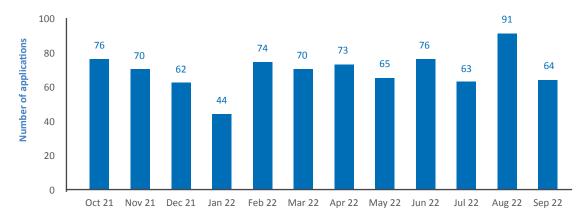


Planning and subdivision – average processing time

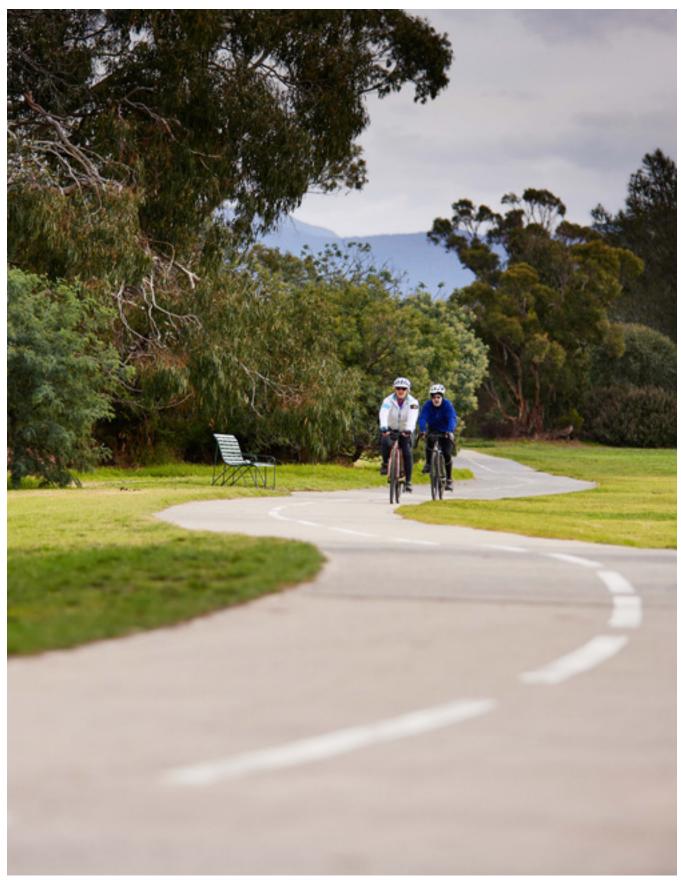

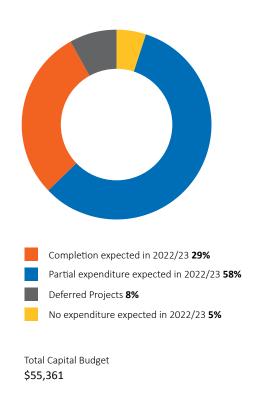
