Clarence set to swing for the 28th annual Jazz Festival

THE 28TH ANNUAL CLARENCE JAZZ FESTIVAL, PROUDLY PRESENTED BY CLARENCE CITY COUNCIL, WILL ONCE AGAIN BE LIGHTING UP NIPALUNA/ HOBART'S EASTERN SHORE WITH A DAZZLING DISPLAY OF MUSIC, ART, AND CULINARY DELIGHTS IN 2024.

Spread over five amazing days from Wednesday, 28 February – Sunday, 3 March 2024, the program is jam-packed with live music, art, food, drinks, and activities for the whole family.

Clarence City Council Mayor Brendan Blomeley said that the 2024 Festival is set to be bigger, better, more sustainable, and more accessible than ever before.

"The Clarence Jazz Festival is truly the highlight of our annual events calendar and is an incredibly popular event not just in our Clarence community, but throughout Greater Hobart, as well as interstate visitors," he said.

"The 2024 festival will feature some of Tasmania's finest musical talents and premier artists from across the country and around the world, and, for the first time, the whole event will be based at the Rosny Farm and in the Rosny Parklands."

Rosny Farm and the Parklands are accessible by bus, bike, ferry, foot, or car, and holding the event in an all-in-one location offers festival-goers an unprecedented opportunity to immerse themselves in the full festival experience.

The work of the 2024 Clarence Jazz Festival Artist in Residence, Leigh Rigozzi, will be apparent throughout the Farm and Parklands with his recent transformation of the Rosny Parklands storage shed into a work of art fit for a festival. He'll also be joining the lineup on Friday night for an hour of experimental live drawing and live music fusion, and his piece 'A Walk Around the Block' is the inspiration behind the 2024 Festival's visual styling and logo.



The hugely impressive 2024 Clarence Jazz Festival Ambassador, multi award-winning Australian-born, Germany-based trombonist and composer Shannon Barnett, will also appear throughout the festival both as a headliner and as a guest with local acts, as will the 2024 Clarence Jazz Festival Scholars – Leif Sweeney, Jamie Zieserl, and Otto Kneupfer.

Hardcore jazz fans will also be impressed with the inclusion of Australian legend and jazz heavyweight Vince Jones who will play two sets with his world-class quintet on Saturday evening.

Mayor Blomeley said that this year will be the most delicious to date with a smorgasbord of local food and drink vendors featured throughout.

"We are thrilled to be showcasing so many incredible Clarence producers and businesses this year," he said.

"The cultural impact of the Clarence Jazz Festival, which is Tasmania's longest-running festival, is impossible to overstate, however, the economic impact is also vast and is now being spread even further to our regions outside the city centre."

Part of this focus on Clarence produce includes the exciting announcement of the newly named Frogmore Jazz Lounge and associated Coal River Valley Wine Tasting Experience, which attendees will be able to enjoy sipping from new, branded, reusable Clarence Jazz Festival cups which can be returned for a refund or taken home as a handy souvenir.

Then there's the music. Comprised of daytime and night-time, free and ticketed, and traditional and experimental gigs and boasting a whopping 48 total acts over the festival, the 2024 Clarence Jazz Festival has something for everyone.

prestigious 2023 Awards for Planning Excellence Tasmania.

Council, in partnership with Milangkani Projects, was awarded the 'Planning with Country' title for the takara limuna trail at Bedlam Walls, Geilston Bay.

In partnership with Niche Studio and Entura, council was recognised for the outstanding community engagement in the consultation for the Seven Mile Beach Local Area Plan - winning the 'Stakeholder Engagement' award.

Consulting with our community and reaching out to those who are most connected to our projects is key to our success in so many areas - and these awards have proven that.

Council held its last meeting of the year on 11 December and ended the year with two big

decisions for the city. Council endorsed a proposal for the new AFL High Performance Centre to call Rosny Park its home and also approved the Skylands Masterplan, enabling it to move to the next stage – the development of a Structure Plan.

In the year ahead there will be further work done to complete a key strategic project, the City Heart Plan, and the next and final stage of consultation will be on the draft of this master plan.

I hope everyone is able to get out and about and enjoy our city which really does come alive at this time of year- whether that be on one of our many tracks or trails, beaches, or at a cultural event.

May the year ahead bring you and your loved ones joy and prosperity.

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RICHMOND BICENTENARY

'Weekends in the Valley' continue into 2024



RICHMOND IS GEARING UP FOR THE SECOND OF FIVE 'WEEKENDS IN THE VALLEY' AS PART OF THE EXCITING RICHMOND BICENTENARY PROGRAM.

The second weekend, from 18-22 January, focuses on sharing the rich history of Richmond through a range of talks, roadshows, dances, and exhibitions, and marks the 200th anniversary since Richmond was proclaimed a town.

The Richmond Bicentenary was officially launched last month, and the village is still buzzing from a spectacular display of music, costumes, and vintage vehicles in a community street parade along Bridge Street, and of course, Australia's oldest bridge.

The parade exhibited stories through the ages telling the history of Richmond from the traditional owners of the region, the Mumirimina people, right through to the current day.

As people approached the iconic bridge there was a moment of truth-telling where participants were asked to 'think as they walk' in an act of recognition for the Mumirimina people who within 15 years of Richmond's establishment no longer remained on their land.

On each of the five Richmond Bicentenary 'Weekends in the Valley', an exhibition will be on display at Richmond Courthouse titled, *Mumirimina: People and Country*.

The installation features 12 artworks depicting the people and stories of lands stolen and lives ruined, highlighting the striking contrast between Richmond's prosperity and the overwhelming Mumirimina loss.

"So much has taken place here in Richmond, there are many stories to be told, and this has been a truly memorable event to recognise those who have lived here before us," Mayor Blomeley said.

"Not everyone knows the river at Richmond was used by the Mumirimina people for hunting and fishing for thousands of years but







their stories are just as important as the establishment of the village and the Coal Valley which became a rich agricultural area.

"I look forward to the events yet to come to commemorate this very special part of Clarence and encourage everyone to come and learn more about this very significant place."

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Tracks and trails put Clarence on the map

RESERVES AND RECREATION ARE THRIVING, AND RECENT ATTENTION IS NOW SOLIDIFYING THESE AS AN ABUNDANT FEATURE IN THE CHARACTER OF CLARENCE.

In the recent 2023 Awards for Planning Excellence Tasmania, the takara limuna trail project at Bedlam Walls Geilston Bay won the 'Planning with Country' award.

The partnership project between Milangkani Projects and Clarence City Council is an immersive truth-telling trail experience, sharing the story of the area's Aboriginal culture and history.

Through track design and creation, locally commissioned artworks and oral recordings, and written words in palawa kani, walkers can learn of the ancient traditions of the Mumirimina people as they trail along the serene headland.

The final stage of development at the Clarence Mountain Bike Park and Meehan Range has been completed with over \$300,000 injected into the construction of new high-quality tracks.

A new jumps line, aptly named 'Jack Jumper', is the newest addition to the trail network and was officially opened on 12 December.

'Flow Monster', opened in April 2023, has already recorded over 47,000 riders and is now surveyed as the most popular track in the park.

Other upgrades include a specialised coaching and skills area, and a green-rated climb called the 'Elevator Climb' which has opened more options for more people riding the back country trails of the Meehan Range.





Council has contributed over \$170,000 to date on recent works at the Clarence Mountain Bike Park and Meehan Range and \$169,110 in funding has been received through the Australian Government's Building Better Regions grant.

The completion of the new track and dedicated coaching and skills area makes the Clarence Mountain Bike Park one of, if not the most family-friendly bike park in Tasmania.

Clarence City Council also recently won a substantive government grant to upgrade foreshore trails at Montagu Bay and Anzac Park as part of the Better Active Transport in Tasmania Grant Program.

The trail upgrades will come in addition to current trail upgrades at Sheoak Point Rosny, helping to better connect the Clarence and Hobart, as well as provide residents more alternatives for transport.

Clarence should conduct an Elector's Poll on merging with councils to the east. Because Clarence is financially sustainable, we were not included in the proposed South-eastern Council. Financial sustainability is a product of the size of the ratepayer base, especially the commercial rate, to support council services. Including Clarence would enhance the economies of scale.

The sustainability of small rural councils is hampered by a disproportionate infrastructure requirement, e.g. more roads, compounded by fewer rate payers and a virtually non-existent commercial rate income.

Savings through fewer councillors and senior executives, should employ more workers, not enlarge the administrative empire.
